Phone box trail

A fun family walk around a cream coloured slice of Hull history

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This trail around 12 of our classic K6 phone kiosks should take you about 90 mins, with plenty of opportunities to stop for a drink or bite to eat along the way. It's ideal for youngsters who want to learn a little more about Hull's colourful past – from the

The trail begins in Old Town's indoor Trinity Market where you'll find our oldest K1 kiosk dating from the 1920s. It's one of only five still in existence and is nestled among the many stalls and traders in the market.

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- Leave Trinity Market and head down the brilliantly named Land Of Green Ginger before turning onto Bowlalley Lane. Turn left onto Lowgate and you'll find a pair of Grade II listed K6 twins located right outside the old Post Office.
- Head around the corner to Alfred Gelder Street to find another Grade II listed K6 at location number three.



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Take a right and head down Guildhall Road to the Rose Bowl outside Queens Gardens to find the next cream kiosk. This one is located next to the historic Beverley Gate.

To find number five, head across to Queen Victoria Square, and then up King Edward Street. You'll spot the phone box just before you reach Jameson Street.

You're halfway there - continue up King Edward Street and Prospect Street and you'll find our next stopping point near the statue of Hull's famous flying daughter, Amy Johnson.

Head down Brook Street and turn left towards the new Hammonds of Hull food court. Our newly revamped K6 is nestled in the corner next to Bug Records. This is an ideal mid-trail stopping point for refreshments.

For phone box number eight we need to leave Hammonds on the Jameson Street exit where you'll find our next K6 kiosk.

Kiosk number nine is one of a pair of K6 twins located outside KCOM's Carr Lane HQ. Look out for our giant "Hello good stuff" banner. Head along Carr Lane and onto Paragon Street, past the Hull Cheese pub and you'll find kiosk ten under the willow trees, outside the attractive 1950s-built Queens House.

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It's a bit of a walk to Kiosk number 11. Follow the dots on the map to the Fruit Market, go past the famous Minerva pub and you'll find kiosk number 11 by the waterfront on Nelson Street.

To find kiosk number 12, follow the map back to Old Town. Last but not least, this kiosk has been painted gold to mark Hull boxer Luke Campbell's gold medal triumph at the London 2012 Olympics.

We hope you enjoyed your trek around some of the city's wonderful history, as seen through our iconic cream phone boxes.
